Profiles of Early LRI and OLLI Members

As we've researched the history of LRI and OLLI to help celebrate our 25th anniversary next year, we were impressed with how many key volunteers among our members have been the subject of features in LRI or OLLI newsletters. But some early key people have been overlooked or should be highlighted because we've talked with them recently.

This fall, we'll try to remedy that. In addition to the profile of founder Kathryn Brooks, published in the Sept 18 issue, here are a few more early members who helped get the institute started.

Murray Minster joined in 1993. A Foreign Service retiree, he was passionate about recruiting instructors, being responsible for as many as 57 classes. He remembers walking the halls in the Mason history department and persuading professors to teach, and using his rolodex to get other Foreign Service experts

to speak. He lives in the Westminster Retirement Community and is still a member.

Henry Shenker was a charter member who "for many years singlehandedly processed the class registrations—a daunting task but one that is at the heart of our operation," according to then president Laura Cambern. Henry was also a Board member and helped acquire the first computer equipment.

Ed Swoboda was a charter member who remembers that financial records were not kept as he thought they should be. At Lilyan Spero's request he became a Board member and an early treasurer. He gave the investment group the name "Forum" to distinguish it from a club. Ed says he taught the first 8-week class titled "Congressional Reform." Four people sat around a card table for this class!
