3rd Saturday, August 18 What's a Router, and Why Do I Want One? LED Lighting Explained

The Computer Club (OLLI Personal Computer User Group, or OPCUG) will meet with its partner, the Potomac Area Technology and Computer Society (PATACS), on Saturday, August 18 at Tallwood. Join us at 12:30 for socializing in the Annex. Program activities begin at 1:00 in TA-1.

What's a Router and Why Do I Want One? Presented by Gabe Goldberg
The electronic box connected between your ISP wall connection and your home
network is almost certainly a router (providing Ethernet ports and WiFi access),

or perhaps it's a router with added capabilities (e.g., modem converting ISP connectivity to Ethernet). You're hardly alone if you haven't given it much thought, since it likely "just works," year after year. But routers are complex devices, computers running operating systems and applications! They're therefore worth informed decisions about selection and configuration and need occasional software updating or replacement to fix problems, improve performance, and (especially) close security exposures. This presentation will answer the question posed above and help you understand and exploit router features.

Gabe shared responsibility for AARP's online Computers and Technology Web site and forums; before that, he co-hosted America Online's advanced Internet forum. He volunteers with his county's law enforcement and other community organizations. He's presently director and Association of Personal Computer User Groups representative for PATACS.

### LED Lighting Explained - Presented by Roger Fujii

A quick primer on this lighting technology includes some interesting examples of possible applications. Roger serves on the Guru Team for the twice-yearly PC Clinics at our Saturday meetings and has been volunteering his technical expertise to OLLI since 2006.
