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From the Desk of the Executive Director: Fall-Term Survey Results

To promote feedback and ensure best practices in the content and accommodation of OLLI programs, OLLI is conducting a survey of the membership following fall and spring terms. Thank you to all who participated in the fall-term survey. The vast majority of feedback was positive. Here are two direct quotes from members regarding the quality of our program:

- Most classes exceeded my expectations.
- Courses with knowledgeable and well-prepared instructors across the spectrum. Minimum use of slides and videos . . . Always enjoy humor and a

light touch. Special events can be gem. In general, very appreciative of programs and rarely is there a poor offering.

It is heartening to hear how well our program is being received. There were a few very specific remarks about programs that did not seem to meet member standards and those concerns are being reviewed by the program committees. Overall, members are very impressed with their courses and our instructors.

There were a few remarks about staging classes off-campus:

- Lack of enough parking can be a frustrating problem. We seem to adjust to promote the OLLI 'community.'
- Usually I travel to all 3 campuses, but this term I took all my classes at the UCP in Reston. Facilities at Loudoun are good; Tallwood leaves something to be desired.
- I needed to drop a class or two because trying to run from an area church to Tallwood and back was just not workable.

We use churches and recreation centers when registrations exceed our campus capacities, as a convenience to ensure the most enrollment, offer increased program choice, and alleviate parking constraints, especially at Tallwood. Some were also concerned about the comfort of the Tallwood campus, including the HVAC system in TA-1—oddly enough, we had two comments on this: one said it was too hot, one said it was too cold. Although we cannot adjust to accommodate personal temperatures, every effort is made to keep the classroom environment comfortable; the university and OLLI do our utmost to keep the facilities updated and inviting. Facilities management is on call for needed painting, repair, and safety services. The OLLI Board is constantly upgrading equipment and chairs, and recently replaced heating, ventilation, and air conditioning so all campuses are modernized and comfortable.

Thank you again for participating in our survey and we welcome your feedback at any time.

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Board Meeting Highlights

The Board of Directors met Friday, March 15, 2019 at Tallwood in Fairfax. President Bill Taylor thanked everyone who helped put together an impressive selection of courses and special events for the upcoming spring term. There are two upcoming events where members will be able to meet the new slate of candidates running for the Board: April 26 and May 3. The session on April 26 will be at the super salad social at the United Christian Parish Church in Reston, and the May 3 session will be at our annual business meeting and picnic at Tallwood. These are important opportunities for members to hear from the candidates and ask them questions.

Executive Director Jennifer Disano reported that, as of March 14, 2019, OLLI total membership is 1,125 (annual membership 1,091 and term membership 34). Conversations with Mason staff are ongoing to see if we can find a more cost-effective solution to putting in a ramp at the rear of the Tallwood facility.

Jennifer announced that Bill Walsh, longtime OLLI site assistant at Tallwood, will retire from OLLI at the end of spring term 2019. Bill has been a dedicated staff member for over a decade. Mike Emery will be replacing Bill Walsh. Many will remember Mike from his previous employment as OLLI's site assistant at Lord of Life Church.

The chair of the Nominating Committee, Evan Douple, announced a slate of eight candidates for positions on the Board of Directors. Three current directors are running for re-election: Terri Feldmayer, Rita Way, and Marianne Metz. Other candidates are Jim Dunphy, Fred Kaiser, Rosemary Lubinski, Carolyn Wyatt, and Margot Marino. Note: the Board Handbook specifies that, in addition to the slate of candidates recommended by the Nominating Committee, other OLLI members may petition for candidacy by presenting valid signatures and verifiable identifications of at least five percent of OLLI members.

The Board approved three resolutions: correction of irregular numbering of resolutions; changes to the Board Handbook Section IV, Committees, B20, Travel Committee; and the

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New Password for Tallwood WiFi - But Wait...!

A new OLLI-Members WiFi access password is posted on classroom, social room, and office bulletin boards. We change the password twice a year (March, September) in an effort to maintain security while maximizing WiFi performance for OLLI members at Tallwood. Our WiFi access points were updated in the spring of 2018, providing better throughput, operation in the 5 GHz band in addition to 2.4 GHz, and a variety of improved performance and other useful capabilities. Since then, the connection speed of our FiOS Internet service has been tripled.

However, a 'feature' of the WiFi software can be termed 'sticky passwords.' Once your phone, tablet, or laptop is connected to "OLLI-Members" with the correct password, that device is 'remembered' for 180 days. You won't need to change your password to the new one posted until your device tweaks you with a 'can't connect' message and offers a login window in your browser.

This unique event will include an incredible array of traditional British pastries and edibles with teas, docent-led tours of this historic Civil War era site, actors in historic costumes, door prizes, and more. Refreshments will be created by OLLI's own Kathleen Pablo, whose gourmet talents are legendary among OLLI members. Most importantly, \$50 of your \$65 registration fee will benefit the Friends of OLLI; you will be issued a receipt for the tax-deductible amount.

Historic Blenheim (ca. 1859) is a brick farm house designed in the Greek revival



style and located in the <u>City of Fairfax</u>. During the <u>American Civil War</u>, <u>Union soldiers</u> were often encamped on the grounds surrounding the house and used it as part of a reserve hospital system. As a result, more than 115 of these soldiers inscribed words and pictures on the first- and second-floor walls, as well as in the attic of the house. Blenheim was added to the <u>National Register of Historic Places</u> in 2001.

Answers to your pressing questions about OLLI etiquette

Your choices are not easy: be 30 minutes late and inflict discomfort on an entire class; be 30 minutes early and inflict self-imposed discomfort on yourself; or avoid the problem by refusing to enroll. Not easy choices. May I suggest you alter your outlook, and convert a problem into an opportunity?

Choosing to arrive 30 minutes early would allow you relax with coffee or tea, and a crunchy cookie. Invite a friend for an early chat, or use this social time to speak to new possible friends. [The ones with the red dots on their name tags have fascinating stories of how they found OLLI.] Or just sit quietly and meditate on how you are no longer beholden to clock or calendar. Choosing an early class opens up 50 percent more lecture possibilities than boycotting the 9:40 classes. Think of it as embracing a fuller life, not losing sleep. Choose to enrich yourself, not cause disturbance. All of us at first classes thank you. But the biggest beneficiary will be you!


