# **Board Meeting Highlights**

The Board of Directors met Friday, February 15, 2019, at Tallwood. President Bill Taylor announced that a committee dedicated to honoring OLLI's volunteers has been created. Diane Stanley and Marguerite Johnson will lead this committee.

Bill congratulated the OLLI Players for their fine performances at venues around the county where they bring joy to residents in retirement and assisted living facilities. He encourages anyone who has not seen them perform to take advantage of the opportunity to do so. These events are also outreach opportunities where OLLI Players distribute OLLI flyers to the audience.

In accordance with the OLLI Bylaws, the chair of the nominating committee, Evan Douple, received the Board's approval to appoint the following OLLI members to serve on the nominating committee. They are Marguerite Johnson, David Talaber (from the Board of Directors), Bill Ackerman, Mary Coyne, Nancy Scheeler, Angie Talaber, and Tom Urman (from the general OLLI membership). The Board also approved a resolution to issue a lifetime membership to Sharon Bulova in recognition of her service to Fairfax County. A resolution was passed to approve the establishment of a small ad hoc committee to carry out small focus groups on core issues that affect our members.

Executive Director Jennifer Disano reported that, as of February 7, 2019, OLLI total membership is 1,147 (annual membership is 1,122 and term membership is 25). A draft drawing has been provided to OLLI from Mason design officials for the cost and installation of a ramp from the back lot at Tallwood to the upper level classroom and restrooms. The estimated cost is around \$50K. More negotiations are being pursued with Mason to reduce this estimate and find alternatives that may be more economical.

Jennifer McMahon is stepping down from her role as program associate. The current registrar, Shannon Morrow, will move into the program associate job. Shannon has worked at OLLI since 2015 and is well qualified to assume this position. Susan Job (current site assistance at Lord of Life Church) will take on the registrar job. Susan's last position was working for Western Dental in the position as information technology project manager. She is familiar with Microsoft Office suite and her skills and experience to take over the position of registrar.

Jennifer Disano met with City of Fairfax staff and negotiated a low rent rate for the Sherwood Center. The Center has excellent audiovisual system capability and adequate parking to meet our needs. This venue will compensate for the loss of space for certain times at Church of the Good Shepherd.

A Gnawing Issue in Classroom Etiquette

Through several sources, including member comments, personal observation, and an OLLI suggestion box, Ms. Ettakit has become aware that some members have been guilty of classroom eating behaviors that exceed the bounds of good taste. As a result, classes have been disrupted to varying degrees in ways that interfere with classmates' ability to enjoy what is being presented and reflect a lack of respect for our volunteer instructors.

Certainly, most people are unlikely to be offended by coffee and cookies/pretzels from the social room. However, it is important to be aware of your effect on people seated near you: crunchy snacks (even pretzels) can be a source of distracting noise. Packaged snacks can be disturbing, sometimes especially so when the offender tries to minimize noise by being slow and careful but succeeds only in creating a protracted, lengthy rustling!

Although there may be a microwave oven available, please do not heat up a full meal for consumption during a class. Not only does that impose your dining spread on nearby members, it produces unwelcome aromas such as garlic in the classroom. During a lecture, that is clearly unacceptable.

Eating during class is, of course, okay in cases where food is part of the deal and is provided for everyone in the class. Examples are cooking demonstrations, end-of-term parties, or the breakfast lecture series with Mason professors. The key here is that EVERYONE has food.

Ms. Ettakit urges being aware of the effect that in-class snacking can have on fellow OLLI members and our instructors. She would be loath to entertain the possibility of entirely banning food and drink in classrooms, as is done at some sites.
