Payment Options at OLLI – Which One is Right for You?

With spring term registration just days away, did you know that OLLI has several payment options for renewing your annual \$450.00 membership fee?

Generally, OLLI encourages members to pay membership dues in full at the time of registration. However, for those who would like the financial benefit of spreading out payment over the course of a year, OLLI offers two types of convenient installment plan agreements: monthly and quarterly. If interested, please fill out and submit to the Tallwood office the installment plan agreement form, which can be downloaded from the OLLI website (click here) or picked up at the Tallwood office. Once the agreement is signed and approved, OLLI will automatically deduct \$37.50 a month or \$112.50 a quarter (depending on the plan you chose) from your debit or credit card. Members who take advantage of the installment payment option certify their obligation to pay within the terms of the agreement for the full \$450.00 value of annual dues. Installment plans must be renewed annually. An installment plan agreement form can be submitted at any time, but we urge you to act now, so your membership is renewed in time for priority registration beginning on February 25.

Separately, members with a financial hardship may be eligible for financial assistance from OLLI to cover a portion of the cost of membership. The financial assistance application can be downloaded from the OLLI website (click here) or visit the Tallwood office for an application. All financial assistance inquiries are confidential.

The Mystery of the Centerville Six

The Mystery of the Centerville Six would be a good title for a novel, but it was the subject of a recent lecture delivered by local historian Jim Lewis at OLLI.

Decades ago, six bodies were discovered on land soon to be the parking lot of a McDonalds. Who were they? How did they get there? As Mr. Lewis unwound the tale, it had something for everyone—local history ("I think I ate there"), the Civil War (this part of Northern Virginia saw epic battles and small skirmishes; local historians and civil war buffs helped solve the mystery), and forensic anthropology (including the Smithsonian).

When a local relic hunter uncovered the graves, questions immediately arose. A crime scene? No, brass buttons and musket balls suggested the Civil War. Were they North or South soldiers? When were they killed? What were their units? After several years, and with the help of Fairfax County, the Smithsonian's forensic anthropologists, many volunteers, and dedicated researchers, they were answered.

The men belonged to a Massachusetts militia unit. On the eve of the First Battle of Manassas, July 1861, in a skirmish, they became some of the first Union troops to die in the Civil War. Their remains are now interred in a US military cemetery in their home state, and a Civil War Trails memorial plaque now sits in the McDonalds parking lot.

Those in this area literally live on the memories of the War Between the States. Indeed, Jim Lewis became interested in the war history of the region when he found the remains of a Confederate breastwork (a defense fortification) in his backyard. He currently leads local tours of Civil War sites in the Oakton area and is a frequent lecturer at OLLI Mason.
