You may know Dr. Glenn Winters from his "Understanding Opera" classes at OLLI. For nearly two decades he offered us wide-ranging and lively analyses of operas that were to be performed each season by Virginia Opera. This year, of course, COVID-19 has cancelled traditional opera performances, with theaters dark all year. It follows that there are no traditional Virginia Opera productions to introduce in class.

But Dr. Winters has hardly been idle! He has composed a new opera, crafting both music and lyrics for *The Princess and the Pea*. Designed for children, this short comic opera is an adaptation of Hans Christian Andersen's 1835 fairy tale. But this version involves no stack of mattresses. Instead, it features *pea soup*—and an ecstatic ode to green vegetables.

In a Virginia Opera production that you can stream (free), Dr. Winters' whimsical words are superbly sung by three young performers who clearly relished their comic roles. Don't expect *Tosca*. 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
